Best Practices for Teaching Music from a Distance

Description: Richmond will present the results of a survey of 200 Texas music educators who identified the best and worst of their experiences with teaching music online. This rapid-fire session will focus on the successful strategies, tools, and resources. Tools to be demonstrated will range from the familiar and proven to new and experimental apps for music instruction.

Covid has given first-hand experiences with distance technology to many people who would not have otherwise experienced them. On the positive side, we have learned that with today's tools, more things are possible through distance than we imagined, especially with motivated students and adequate infrastructure. On the other hand, they have helped us identify problems that we need to solve before distance technologies are universally applicable. Although some research has shown setbacks during this time, music teachers are creative and resilient. They have found ways to solve common problems and freely shared their ideas.
